Pilot Alternative Provision Music Offer is a Big Hit!

This term at Esteem Valley Academy we launched the EVA x Elementz Studio's 'Music Collaboration Project', a pilot internal AP offer delivered by Esteem Valley Academy's Music department in partnership with The Elementz Studio. Delivered from The Elementz Studio, a leading independent professional recording studio in Nottingham City Centre, the project provides students with a unique opportunity to learn within a commercial environment, working alongside world class music producers and engineers who are actively working at the top level of the music business. Focusing on music production, the project allows students to achieve a BTEC Music qualification at level 1 & 2, gaining an understanding of developing music products through practical application. Students experience 'listening sessions' where they are given professional feedback, have access to lyric writing masterclasses and learn how to mix and master the tracks they produce to a commercial standard. In addition to the in house offer, students are given access and exposure to a range of industry opportunities through the Elementz connections with the Nottingham music scene. Links with the Motorpoint Arena, Rock City, Theatre Royal and other music venues allow students to explore the variety of career opportunities available within the music industry from performing and producing to lighting and sound engineering. The course has been a huge hit with students at Esteem Valley Academy in it's first term with a second day to be introduced in the summer term and a showpiece event in planning watch this space!!



Esteem Valley Academy have ended the spring term by taking part in the Living Eggs project. Here's what their Head of Primary, Grace, had to say on delivery day...





"We have had an egg-cellent start to the week at Bennerley with the arrival of ten eggs which are currently being incubated at a very prescice 37.7 degrees. We have great egg-spectations for the coming days as the pipping starts (where the chicks use a small tooth at the end of their beak to peck through the shell ready to hatch). Both children and adults onsite are super egg-cited to welcome the new arrivals that form part of our memorable experience offer that enhances each student's personal development. The chicks are also supporting our Primary Provisions topic about the environment where , in science, we have been comparing the anatomy and physiology of living things on our planet, in RE we have been studying Bible stories including the creation of the world and new beginnings, as well as writing poetry about "One Broken Planet" and the importance of looking after the amazing creatures in our environment. Despite our im-peck-able sense of humour and the development of my inner comedi-hen, we will be sad to see our chicks leave us at the end of term, but I am sure they will have an egg-splosion of fun in their free range adventures."

Meet Bella the School Dog

After successfully completing her Therapy dog assessment in September 2020 Bella has gained valuable experience supporting students out of education on a 1:1 basis and continues to do this work alongside her role at Esteem Valley Academy. Bella has been working at Esteem Valley Academy since 4th September 2023, predominantly based at their Sawley site with KS4 but regularly checks in on their Primary and KS3 students at our Bennerley site. Bella has a calm, friendly nature, loves attention and has been a huge hit with both students and staff.

What can Bella do?

She can give deep pressure therapy (DPT) which relieves stress and anxiety. She can sit, wait, give paw, lie down, fetch, leave, roll over and back up, which is great when the pupils get to go on dog walks down the River Trent. She is a great listener for pupils and they want to read or speak to Bella. Bella has also learnt the 'Flourish' programme which means she can support pupils with emotions, helping them to build trust.

What are the benefits?


Cognitive: companionship with a dog stimulates memory, problem-solving and game-playing.

Social: a dog provides a positive mutual topic for discussion, encourages responsibility, teaches students empathy and prompts social skills.

Emotional: a school dog improves self-esteem, acceptance from others and lifts mood, often provoking laughter and fun. Dogs can also teach compassion and respect for other living things as well as relieving anxiety. Stroking and engaging with a dog can lower stress levels.

Physical: interaction with a dog provides tactile stimulation and can promote and encourage physical exercise.

Literacy skills: the calming, non-judgemental environment that therapy dogs create, helps to nurture young people's enthusiasm for reading and provides them with the confidence to read aloud.





Mother's Day at Holbrook

Holbrook School for Autism hosted their second annual Mother's Day Afternoon Tea this term. It was wonderfully received with a performance from Holbrook's very own choir going down a storm with both parents and staff. "The idea came from developing a social aspect for the parents" says Gemma, Family support worker at Holbrook. Fountains Primary School Apprenticeship Story

"Congratulations to Olivia McGibbon who gained QTS in December 2023. Olivia came to our school in September 2014 as a Teaching Assistant Apprentice when she was 18. On completion of her apprenticeship she gained a Teaching Assistant role and then began her Foundation Degree after school at Burton and South Derbyshire College. From September 2018 Olivia started employment as an Unqualified Teacher alongside undertaking her Foundation Degree, GSCE in Human Biology and then a top up Honours degree. In September 2023, following 5 years of successful Teaching and a block Teaching placement in a mainstream school for a term, Olivia underwent the 12 week 'straight to teaching' route, finally gaining QTS in December 2023. During this time Olivia proved to be an outstanding classroom practitioner and had numerous visits by Ofsted in our last two inspections. She has bought pedagogy, tact and hard work to our school team and will no doubt flourish into an exemplar Teacher.

Olivia is a shining example of how the apprenticeship route can help support individuals to achieve a fulfilling career. I am confident that she will lead pupils to become confident, independent individuals, providing a classroom environment that is innovative and inspirational. She has personalised her approach towards all pupils, striving to ensure that all of the children she teaches, reach their full potential regardless of their starting point. She is a firm believer that all children have a right to an exciting and vibrant classroom using confidently the formative and summative assessment in place in school.

Olivia is professional and an excellent team player but also develops others around her well. Although Olivia's journey has been a long one, I know that she will continue to being hard work, fun and 'sparkle' to any teaching team, whilst fully embracing the chance of developing any whole school initiatives further, to enhance Fountains Primary School for us all."





Sibling Support Group at Fountains Primary

Esteem North Academy Updates

Esteem North Academy continues to grow from circa 80 pupils in April 22 to now 290 – over a 3 fold increase, within their 3 Academy sites. They are working closely with Esteem to source a 4th site to house their additional pupils and staffing cohort, with no sign of numbers slowing down!

As ENA grows, they continue to pursue further opportunities to support their pupils' development and career aspirations, including most recently at their High Peak site, career visits to Y10 and Y11 pupils...

Pupils met Kyle Mellor, a local gym owner and fitness trainer, Mark Dunning, who works at the University of Nottingham as a Professor of small animal internal medicine, and PCSO K Green and PC Podmore who visited to discuss County Lines.

"I really enjoyed delivering the talks" said Mark Dunning after visiting. "The pupils were great, and all showed a clear interest, which was great to see. I was inspired to see that despite many having low self-esteem and challenges in conventional learning environments, they all showed sparks of enthusiasm and triggered discussions around the subject. I haven't enjoyed giving a presentation so much in years!"

Congratulations to staff at Esteem North for creating these wonderful opportunites for their pupils to learn about different career paths and well done to the pupils for representing the school so well!







Lessons from Auschwitz

Six learners from Fountains post-16 provision, recently took part in the 'Lessons from Auschwitz' project. This involved participating in online seminars with educators and students from many other schools around the Midlands. They then had a really long, hard, but also interesting and educational day trip to Poland. While there, they visited a Jewish synagogue and Auschwitz-Birkenau the former Nazi concentration and extermination camp. They learned about the terrible events of the Holocaust, whilst also focusing on some of the personal stories of the people that were involved, to help them understand that this was a human event, and not something carried out by monsters. At the end of the day, as the sun went down, there was a service conducted by a Rabbi, and each person lit a candle to reflect and remember. After returning, the group attended a further seminar where they heard first-hand from a Holocaust survivor. The students are now ambassadors for the project and are responsible for sharing their learning with others, and to be confident in speaking out against
